
Christmas Jumper Day

Early Years - Reception

Classes 1, 2 and 3 have settled well into school full time this half term and are already showing good understanding of their new routines alongside Class 4. The children are enjoying using the different areas around school such as the multisensory room, active learning, and the sensory garden. During our topic of 'Colour' the children have enjoyed sharing the story 'Brown Bear, Brown Bear' and have taken part in mark making activities and creating collages linked to the animals in the story. In communication and language, they have been responding to their name during activities and single words when finding the correct animals from the story. In expressive arts they have enjoyed exploring colour using paint. The children also enjoyed having a Christmas Stay and Play.





























Key Stage 1

This term the theme of our topic has been 'Out and About'. In Literacy the children studied a selection of poems from the book 'Out and About' by Shirley Hughes. They used their senses to explore a firework poem, a poem about mud, wet and cold and a Christmas poem. They enjoyed listening to different sounds, exploring different tastes and smells. In Maths the children explored quantities, shapes, solving problems and sharing. The children enjoyed picnics in class sharing food. In knowledge and understanding of the world the children explored properties of materials and identified different materials and their uses. In Expressive Arts they used a variety of materials and techniques to create artwork and decorations related to Autumn, Bonfire night, and Christmas. They also focused on different sounds and performing in front of others through singing and using instruments including our Christmas music session! In PSHECC the children learnt about how to stay safe at school and around the house.

Lower Key Stage 2


This half term, our topic has been "Shine a Light" and the children explored this through Expressive arts and knowledge, skills and understanding the world. In literacy the children explored the story 'Sir Charlie Stinky Socks' by Kristina Stephenson through writing and role play. They also had a go at planning and writing their own imaginary stories. In Maths they continued to develop their number skills through songs, games, challenges, and written tasks. The children also explored different lengths. In topic, they investigated light and dark, shadows and reflections. The pupils particularly enjoyed creating shadow puppets!
